HOME SAFETY THIS SUMMER



It's that time of the year when we turn our mind to the hotter days and a long summer enjoying our wonderful outdoors.

One of the advantages of living in our area is the abundance of beautiful bush land and natural fauna. There are a few things that can be done around your home and property pretty easily, which are raking up all dead leaves and sticks around your garden especially in your gutters, as embers can travel as much as 40km floating through the air and set fire to your house.

Check your front door welcome mat is fireproof and not a brush type mat fibre that could be flammable. Keep a fireproof, bushfire emergency bag that contains all your valuable information and documents that you can grab in a hurry.

Gas bottles need to be stored safely and not sit outside as they can explode in extreme fires. Keep an eye on the Australian Fire Danger Ratings levels, and stay safe.

PLANT PARENTING: TIPS FOR THE NOVICE GARDENER

Are you a novice gardener starting your gardening journey? Exciting times lie ahead. Sydney's Plant Market offers insights to help novice gardeners navigate common pitfalls and set their plants up for success.

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them:

- 1. Over-crowding: when plants are placed too closely together, they compete for essential resources like light, water, and nutrients. Know the mature size of each plant and leave ample space between each.
- 2. Over-watering: this is the top misstep among new gardeners. Avoid watering on a strict schedule. Instead, check the soil's moisture. A quick finger test can reveal if your garden needs water or not. The soil should be wet several inches down.
- 3. Too much sun (or too little): not every plant craves continuous sunlight. Research or consult our in-store experts to determine your plant's light requirements. Adjust its location accordingly.
- **4. Neglecting drainage:** prolonged exposure to stagnant water can cause root rot. Always ensure your garden beds or pots promote adequate drainage.
- Poor soil selection: plants are picky about their soil. The wrong mix can affect growth and health. Use the recommended soil type for each plant.



- 6. Ignoring pests & diseases: new gardeners might not recognise the early symptoms until it's too late. You should regularly inspect your plants including the undersides of leaves. Look for tiny bugs, discoloration, or unusual spots. If you find any issues, discuss with a professional how to treat them.
- 7. The wrong pot: the right pot is essential. Choose one roughly 2 inches larger than the plant's root ball. Always opt for one with drainage holes and select a material that completements your plant's moisture preferences.





MINNS RIDES ROUGHSHOD OVER HILLS COMMUNITY

A cap on the number of dwellings at the Hills Showground Precinct has been scrapped by the Minns government before a promised site for a new school has been identified.

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said the decision showed absolute disdain for the people of The Hills Shire, which is already buckling under the pressure of an infrastructure shortfall.


"In our conversations with the NSW Government, we were told that the number of homes in the Hills Showground would be restricted to 5,000 until a new school site had been identified and funded," Mayor Gangemi said.

"Now the Minns government has discarded that, paving the way for almost double the number of homes without the schools so desperately needed by families within The Hills.

"This shows that the Minns government is prepared to ride roughshod over the Hills community and cram in as many homes as possible without securing the required infrastructure."

State Member for Castle Hill and Hills Shire Councillor

Mark Hodges said public schools were bursting at the seams in The Hills Shire. "Our population is booming, and our classrooms are full, yet we have no commitment from the NSW Government to upgrade our



"The recent funding announcement for schools by the Minns government did not include any new school funding within The Hills, despite the Department of Education raising the need for a school to be located in a priority precinct, such as the Showground.

"By 2036, we will have more than 90,000 new residents living across The Hills; of that number, 20,000 will call the Showground Precinct home. This community has every right to feel concerned about what the Minns government is inflicting on our Shire."

The NSW Government rezoned the Showground Precinct for medium-to-high-density development in 2017 as part of its Planned Precinct Program along the Sydney Metro Northwest.

The precinct will have 9,500 dwellings at total capacity, of which over 3,500 have already been approved. The number of homes was limited to 5,000 until the NSW Government provided the necessary infrastructure.

The decision to scrap the cap follows a series of moves by the Minns government towards facilitating overdevelopment in The Hills without appropriate increases in infrastructure.

Before the state election, the NSW Planning Minister Paul Scully identified the Cherrybrook Precinct as "ripe" for additional development, despite the Place Strategy limiting the precinct to 3,200 new homes in buildings of three to five storeys.

The NSW Department of Planning and Environment also wrote to Council, confirming that changes may be made to the Cherrybrook Precinct.

In June, the State Government unveiled an initiative allowing developers to increase the height and density of their projects by an extra 30 per cent over local controls if they allocate at least 15 per cent of their development to affordable housing for 15 years.

Mayor Gangemi said The Hills already felt the impacts of the Minns government's decisions.

"A planning proposal for a spot rezoning on Seven Hills Road was progressed to Gateway Determination by the Sydney Central City Planning Panel in July, overruling Council's decision not to proceed. This decision seemed inconsistent with a previous proposal, also located in Baulkham Hills Town Centre, but was rejected by this panel just before the state election."

"I believe the family-friendly character of The Hills is under assault due to the collective changes imposed by the Minns government," he said.

COUNCIL RENAMES ROSE GARDEN IN HONOUR OF QUEEN ELIZABETH II

Roxborough Park Rose Garden, located within Alfred Henry Whaling Memorial Reserve, in Baulkham Hills, will now be called Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Rose Garden in dedication to Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, who died in September 2022 after reigning for 70 years.

The decision to rename the rose garden follows a Mayoral Minute in September 2022 by the Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi, to rename a Hills Shire park, building or significant place in her honour.





"The late Queen exemplified her commitment in various ways, whether as a mechanic during World War II, championing numerous environmental causes, supporting charities, or connecting with individuals across the globe. Her essence was always rooted in selfless service," Mayor Gangemi said.

"Naming this garden in her honour is a fitting testament to her extraordinary dedication to our nation and the world. This special place will undoubtedly inspire the residents of The Hills, both now and in the years to come."

The rose garden has been a favourite amongst residents and visitors since its establishment in 1972.

CHANGING LIVES AT RDA

Nicole King was only 12 years old when she first started volunteering at Riding for the Disabled NSW in Ryde. "I was a horse mad kid!" Nicole says. "I learnt a lot of skills through great mentors and other volunteers at the centre." Thirty years later, she's the Head Coach at RDA's Tall Timbers Centre in the Gables. "It was an opportunity not to be missed – there's a reason you get offered opportunities to do things," Nicole adds. So you might as well jump at it and see where it goes."

The Riding for the Disabled Association NSW was founded in 1972 by Pearl Batchelor OAM after she visited the RDA in England in the early 1970s. The first lessons were held at Pearl's Tall Timbers property, originally in West Pennant Hills, where the first participants in the program came from Northcott Society and Crowle Home.

Since then, there have been many changes at the Tall Timbers Centre, including two changes of location to Kellyville in 1976, and to the current Gables

site in 1999. Now located near the border of the Hills Shire and Hawkesbury Council areas, participants come to RDA from all over both regions and beyond.

For Nicole, there's no such thing as a 'typical day' at Tall Timbers. Each participant has a personalised program designed to be engaging, therapeutic and fun. "Participants are able to learn skills on the ground working with horses that will translate back into life or work skills." Nicole explains.

Not only are the programs hand-picked for each participant; the horses are too. "All the horses have their own story, their own likes and dislikes," Nicole says. "We match our riders with our horses and our volunteers to make sure it's a happy combination."

That connection with the horses and the use of riding as a therapeutic activity has seen many success stories come out of the RDA Tall Timbers Centre. From young people whose favourite time of the week is with their horse, to the adults with acquired disabilities who have needed a reason to do an activity outside of their home, RDA participants can enrol for any number of reasons and find themselves enriched.

Nicole recalls one particularly touching story: "One participant had their first words on the program. His parent come one day to watch, and said 'I don't hear him talk at



home.' And we thought 'He talks to us no worries!' Everyone has a reason for being here, and needs to be here. Seeing them transition is really rewarding. We love seeing the participants thrive in this environment, and that's the role of the organisation; it's why we love it."

RDA Tall Timbers Centre is funded by donations and fundraisers. Upcoming events from the Centre include their Charity Race Day at Hawkesbury Race Club on the 8th of October, which will support five other RDA centres, as well as Bunnings BBQs on the 23rd and 24th of September.

\$75.5 MILLION BOUNDARY ROAD UPGRADE TO PROGRESS TO DESIGN PHASE

A crucial rural road in The Hills Shire's north-west is a step closer to receiving a major upgrade.

Hills Shire Councillors unanimously voted to commence the detailed design phase for the \$75.5 million transformation of Boundary Road at the Council meeting on Tuesday 12 September.

The project will see the rural thoroughfare, which is located on the border of The Hills Shire and Hawkesbury LGAs, upgraded to a major collector road. As part of the works, Boundary Road will be converted to four lanes between Windsor and Old Pitt Town Roads with a roundabout or traffic signals to be constructed at four key intersections.

The Hills Shire Council will commit to 70 per cent in design costs with Hawkesbury City Council contributing to the remaining 30 per cent, which was decided as part of discussions in the Boundary Road Technical Working Group, chaired by the Department of Planning and Environment's Planning Delivery Unit (PDU).

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said he was looking forward to the completion of the project.

"Boundary Road connects our two great communities, and the roadway will further grow in importance as more families choose to live in the area," Mayor Gangemi said

"This is an essential upgrade that will service our existing and future population.

"It's vital that our infrastructure caters for our population growth in Box Hill and Gables and enables safe travel for commuters."

Mayor of Hawkesbury City Council Sarah McMahon said reliable roads were one of the top priorities for local residents.

"We are proud to partner with The Hills Shire to deliver this critical upgrade to Boundary Road," Mayor McMahon said.

"Both councils are committed to getting on with the job of delivering a robust road network for our communities and Boundary Road will serve as a perfect example of how great outcomes are achieved when we work together.

"Boundary Road is an important link for thousands of residents across both local government areas, and its role will only grow in the coming years."

DETAILED DESIGN WILL INCLUDE PLANS FOR:

- the upgrade of Boundary Road to four lanes between Windsor Road and Old Pitt Town Road
- the construction of the Boundary Road bridge over the Killarney Chain of Ponds



- traffic signals at the intersection of Boundary Road, Commercial Road and Brocklebank Street
- construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Boundary Road, Harkness Road and Brahman Road
- traffic signals at the intersection of Boundary Road, Menin Road and George Street and
- traffic signals at the intersection of Boundary Road and Old Pitt Town Road.

The total project cost will be partially funded using the combined \$9.2 million both councils received under the NSW Government's Accelerated Infrastructure Fund (AIF).

The AIF funding will be used to bring forward the first stage of construction, which includes new traffic lights at the intersection of Commercial Road, Brocklebank Street and Boundary Road and the Boundary Road bridge over Killarney Chain of Ponds Creek.

"I want to thank Hawkesbury City Council and the NSW Government for their ongoing support in fast-tracking the upgrade of Boundary Road" Mayor Gangemi added.

HORNSBY SHIRE REMAINS NATION'S TOP MOBILE PHONE RECYCLER

Hornsby Shire residents have been crowned the top mobile phone recycler in Australia for a fifth consecutive year, claiming MobileMuster's Top Collector Award for 2023.

The MobileMuster awards acknowledge the local councils that have collected the most mobile phone components for recycling between 1 April 2022 and 31 March 2023.

Residents of Hornsby Shire deposited 759kgs of unwanted mobile phones, chargers and accessories to the national MobileMuster recycling drive over the 12-month. This was:

- an increase of 13% on the previous year
- 48% higher than the next council and represented
- 12% of total council collections from all across Australia.

At Council's Community Recycling Centre in Thornleigh, residents recycled the equivalent of 6,272 handsets and batteries, conserving 3.2 tonnes of mineral resources through the recycling process of these devices.

The environmental benefits of recycling all these unwanted mobiles and batteries are equivalent to planting 35 trees with avoided co2 emissions equating to 2.28 tonnes.

Hornsby Shire Mayor, Philip Ruddock said he is delighted that Hornsby has once again taken out the top recycling prize.

"To claim this national award for a fifth straight year, it is a testament to our community's commitment to caring for the environment for future generations. We are proud of our residents for taking steps that will benefit all of us," said Mayor Ruddock.

"Local government plays a crucial role in educating the community on the best ways to recycle. I thank our Waste team for their work in sharing this important message, and everyone who has supported this valuable initiative to help us lead the charge as the nation's top mobile phone recycler."

MobileMuster is the product stewardship program of the telecommunications industry. The program recovers more than 95 per cent of the material from old phones and accessories through recycling, which are used in manufacturing new products, reducing the need for virgin materials such as aluminium, copper, gold, silver, cobalt and lithium.



Louise Hyland, CEO of the Australian Mobile Telecommunications Association (AMTA) congratulated Hornsby Shire on its achievement and thanked residents for their recycling efforts.

"We applaud Hornsby Shire's ongoing commitment and success in recycling old and broken mobile phones and their accessories. Educating and encouraging residents, and making recycling easy and accessible, are important ways to keep up these high collection volumes and help the environment for future generations. Well done," Louise said.





FALLS RISK PREVENTION STARTS HERE

In the 2018 Australian Health Report it was revealed that falls are the leading cause of injuries resulting in death. Overall, falls were accounting for 37% of all deaths in Australia.

According to the World Health Organisation (WHO) a fall is "an event which results in a person coming to rest inadvertently on the ground or floor or other lower level".

Over 70% of falls occur in a person's residential environment. There are many different causes for a fall, but ultimately it comes down to the fact a person is losing their balance to a point where they cannot recover their footing. Gravity takes care of the rest, resulting in a fall.

The human body operates a very complex and sophisticated system to keep us in balance. This allows us to ride a bike, balance on a ledge, get out of bed and walk through the bathroom at night, even with the lights off.

The brain takes information from the feet, ankles, knees, hips and spine which then combines the information together with what the eyes see and what the inner ear senses (the balance organ). There are over 20 separate 'sensors' which help the brain to maintain balance.

Multiple things can affect one or more sensors of this system and the body has difficulty maintaining balance. The most common contributors include the use of some specific medications or using several at once, losing parts of our hearing (and with that also parts of the Vestibular System – the balance organ), vision impairment, muscular-skeletal issues such as strength and flexibility and other diseases, for example Diabetes.

Falls prevention is especially important to us at Ear Studio, because our founder Daniel lost his own grandfather due to a fall. In our view the first step to reducing the risk of falling is knowledge. Knowing which factors influence your balance is a great starting point. 




DURAL BOWLING CLUB NEWS

It is very disappointing that the State Government has elected to defer the upgrade works to New Line Rd identified in the previous budget.

This decision puts in doubt any timeline that may have provided any form of commuter relief. Residents and businesses in the rural area that have little choice but to rely on this dysfunctional piece of State infrastructure, will continue to experience anxiety, frustration, and loss of productivity for many years to come.

We do, however, have capacity to make the most of the resources we do control. In August, the Arcadia Galston Residents Association, (AGRA,) hosted an information session on projects that seek community input.

 The first is a proposal to replan and make better use of the Council operational land in Johnston Rd Galston. An opportunity exists to improve the onsite RFS facilities, improve the presentation and safety of Johnston Rd, protect and enhance on site vegetation, provide for potential recreation and to accommodate the future service needs of the Council and the community. I encourage residents to go to the Council website and click on "Have Your Say", Johnston Rd. Or use the following link: https://yoursay.hornsby.nsw.gov.au/planning-proposal-1-3-johnson-road-galston

 In addition, residents were introduced to the Galston Village Public Domain project that seeks to enhance the presentation and functionality of Galston Village.
 The plan is not on exhibition just yet, but Council will be seeking community input into issues such as, safety, parking, way signage, curb and guttering, bus stops, street furniture and landscaping.

On that note, I have also been advised that the recent change in management of the Aldi complex has resulted in toilets becoming available during the day at the eastern end of Galston village.

As we approach the official start of the fire season, I want to acknowledge our remarkable Rural Fire Service volunteers. Across Berowra there are over 1,500 local volunteers across 27 brigades who do a remarkable job. They're an extraordinary group of men and women.

They volunteer all year round. In autumn and winter they undertake drills and hazard reductions and prepare. Over the past year brigades across the two local districts have responded to over 700 incident calls. Floods, storms, multiple-vehicle accidents—no matter what the disaster, they're always there to lend a hand.

But, of course, the role the RFS volunteers play in our fire safety is their most significant contribution. Berowra is a beautiful bushland electorate. But it means we're also a bushfire prone electorate. Every year, our RFS volunteers stand ready to defend properties and

lives during the fire season. Many residents will not have lived through the terrible bushfires that ripped through our area in 2002. Those who did will remember how ferocious and devastating they were.

That is why it is so important to start getting your property ready now, in case we face similar conditions this fire season.

Make sure your bushfire survival plan is up to date and that you undertake important preventative work, like clearing out gutters or keeping your yard free of combustible material.

As part of that bushfire survival plan, you should think about which valuables you need to pack up – so if you need to go, you can before it's too late.

If you've got a pool, I would also encourage you to get a static water supply (SWS) sign at your property entrance. That water might save your own home, or your neighbour's.

Thanks again to the wonderful RFS for all the work they do for our community and for all Australians.

BE FIRE READY

With the weather heating up recently the Rural Fire Service recommends some simple steps you can take to prepare your home for the upcoming bushfire season:

- Trim overhanging trees and shrubs. This can stop the fire spreading to your home.
- **2.** Mow grass and remove cuttings. Have a cleared area around your home.
- **3.** Remove material that can burn around your home (e.g., Door mats, wood piles, mulch, leaves, paint, outdoor furniture).



- **4.** Clear and remove all the debris and leaves from the gutters surrounding your home. Burning embers can set your home on fire.
- **5.** Prepare a sturdy hose or hoses that will reach all around your home. Make sure you've got a reliable source of water.

HILLS COUNCIL NEWS UPDATE

Well spring is certainly here and at times, it has felt like summer!

Earlier this month, I presented at the Glenorie Progress Association meeting on Bushfire Preparedness and in particular the role that The Hills Shire Council plays.

As the Chair of The Hills Bushfire Management Committee and a local volunteer firefighter, I am so passionate about bushfire safety and preparedness.

Thank you to Glenorie Progress Association for hosting this meeting and to Glenorie RSL Club for the space. I was joined by The Hills NSW Rural Fire Service staff along with members of Glenorie Rural Fire Brigade, Maroota Rural Fire Brigade and Hillside Rural Fire Brigade. It was fantastic to see many Glenorie locals and surrounding residents attend this presentation.

Before the presentation, it was interesting to see how many residents chose to 'stay and defend' in the event of a bushfire and then the number that decided afterward that it was best for them to 'leave early'.

This is a key consideration when developing a Bushfire Survival Plan. A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will survive a bush fire or ember attack.

A well prepared home can also be easier for you or firefighters to defend, and is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk. A well prepared home will also give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave.

With hot and drier conditions expected this summer, you may be at higher than normal risk of bush and grass fire. Know your risk

this bush fire season and prepare well ahead. Now is the time to get ready. I recently visited Box Hill Nelson and Sackville North Rural Fire Brigades for their Get Ready Weekend events.

Well done to all our RFS brigades here in The Hills for these informative and important community bush fire preparedness events. For more information visit rfs.nsw.gov.au or contact your local RFS brigade. I'm ready, and I'd like you to be too.

Over the past month, a significant number of pavement rectification works have been undertaken of roads in North Ward as part of the Regional and Local Road Repair Program.

As part of the ongoing flood repair program, further works have recently been undertaken on Pages Wharf Rd at Sackville North. Major pavement stabilisation and two coat sealing has also been undertaken to River Rd between Lower Portland and Wisemans Ferry following damage from the floods of the past few years.

There is still plenty of work required on River Rd, which will take some time, but I am glad that works have commenced. I endeavour to keep the community updated on these works.

FOR ANIMALS KEPT IN PADDOCKS WITHOUT SHADE; SUMMER ISN'T JUST HOT, IT'S HELL

Farm animals typically feel heat stress at 25°C. As the temperature and humidity rises, so does their suffering. A 40°C day can result in organ failure and death. Heat stress also affects weight gain, milk yield and fertility.

The most effective prevention of suffering for animals on a hot day is access to tree shade, as the majority of Hornsby Shire residents provide. But many animals across NSW are not so lucky; stranded in paddocks with no respite from extreme temperatures.

That's because of a loophole in animal welfare legislation, standards and guidelines; saying shade and shelter 'should' be provided, instead of 'must'. This makes it impossible to enforce the provision of shade.

I've asked Hornsby Shire Council to advocate for mandatory shade at our LGNSW Conference in November; where councillors from across NSW vote on policy positions. Disappointingly, not all councillors agreed animal welfare was important.


BIRDS

When walking through bushland reserves it is possible to encounter many birds as they search for food either on the ground, through the undergrowth or in the treetops.

Larger birds, because they are more easily seen appear to be fairly common. However, it can be the smaller birds which tend to captivate a bird watching enthusiast.

It is a very fortunate occurrence to see a bird building its nest, or feeding its demanding juvenile.





To successfully observe most birdlife in bushland forests it is important to remember that humans are intruders in their environment. Most small birds will keep their distance as you walk along a bush track. Wear bush-coloured clothing, move slowly and speak softly.

Don't make sudden movements, like pointing your arm or camera to where you have just spotted a bird. For best results when capturing images of small birds in particular, a telephoto or zoom lens is essential.

Birds are most active searching for food in the early parts of the day.

This year the "Aussie Backyard Bird Count" will be held during Bird Week from Monday October 16 to Sunday October 22.

BROMELIAD SOCIETY OF AUSTRALIA CELEBRATES ITS 60TH

At the next meeting on Saturday, 14th October the Bromeliad Society of Australia will celebrate its sixtieth birthday at the Federation Pavilion, Castle Hill Showground, Castle Hill with Bromeliad sales to the public from 10am with the meeting commencing at 12 noon.

The inaugural meeting took place in 1962, 36 people attended and a decision was made to form a Society. The Australian Bromeliad Society was formed in 1963, the first general meeting was held on 6th July at the Y.M.C.A. in Pitt Street, Sydney and attracted 45 members and today the BSA has 140 members.

The first issue of Bromeletter was published in 1969 and the first public display of Bromeliads was held at the Royal Agricultural Society's Easter Show in the same year.

"Each and every position is vital to the smooth running of our society. Two of our life members who are still actively involved with the BSA are Carolyn Bunnell who joined in 1982 and Allan Beard in 1987." said Ian Hook, President.

National conferences were organised in 1983, 1991 and the highly successful "Bromsmatta" 2015.

However, the major achievement which put our Society on the World Stage was the publication in 1988 of our Book "Growing Bromeliads". It was the first of its kind outside the USA and European countries.

The book was compiled by 13 members of the Society, each writing on the genera of Bromeliads in which they specialised. It was written in simple terms for the novice growers to understand. The book has been updated and is still selling well today.

AN EREMOPHILA FOR EVERY GARDEN

Although Eremophilas (Umu Bushes) grow naturally in the dryer parts of Australia, they can make stunning additions to your garden.

Lyndal will provide tips on growing and caring for Eremophilas, particularly in the wetter Sydney region. Lyndal Thorburn has been leader of the Eremophila Study Group since 2015.

A scientist by training but not by profession, she has kept her interest in biology alive through long term involvement with the Australian Plants Society Canberra and participation in many Citizen Science groups.

She has grown over 100 varieties of Eremophilas in her rather shady Queanbeyan garden and has been delighted to discover that many in the genus are frost hardy and don't need sun all day.






