Services of remembrance and wreath laying are held across our community and offer quiet contemplation, accompanied by the poignant bugle call of the last post.

Local Crew's 10th Year at Tamworth



Every January, when the sun is at its hottest, thousands of country music-loving people make the pilgrimage to the Australian country town of Tamworth for the Toyota Country Music Festival which runs over 10 days.

The heat of over 40°C and the flies are no deterrent as the festival, presented by Tamworth Regional Council, is now in its 52nd year and is recognised as the second biggest country music festival in the world, after the CMA Music Festival in Nashville USA. The town comes alive with ticketed and free shows alike, and buskers line the main streets. Galston based Live Event Services has been providing design and management for the past ten Golden Guitar Award ceremonies. The crew made the five-hour drive in three semi-trailers: one predominantly lighting, one audio and vision, one LED screens, and a van full of camera gear.

Stop Scully's Skyscrapers in Cherrybrook

The Minns government has plans to throw up a mini-Manhattan in Cherrybrook, proposing it as a desperate solution to the housing crisis.

The Cherrybrook precinct is an area characterised by its leafy streets and detached family homes.

With the opening of Cherrybrook Metro Station in 2019, the previous Coalition government worked with Planning NSW and local councils on increasing density around the new transport hub. A three-year process was set to deliver 3200 new homes, comprising a mix of predominantly five storey and three-storey terraces, with the new streets having 50 per cent tree cover.

There was also a desire to deliver a library, community facility and other essential infrastructure, as part of these original plans. The strategy for Cherrybrook Station was finalised following years of work with community engagement, and it was approved by the previous Liberal government in December 2022.

However, I have now learned the current Labor state government is looking to significantly increase the number new residences around Cherrybrook. I understand the new estimated additional rezonings could lead to up to 8000 additional homes with little or no supporting infrastructure.



I am seeking a briefing to understand if the government is proposing to make changes to the Cherrybrook Metro precinct and, if so, what exactly are those changes being considered.

In a letter sent to Planning Minister Paul Scully in February, I asked for an urgent briefing on the proposed changes however, I am yet to have received a reply.

I believe this additional development now being considered in the quiet suburb of Cherrybrook has not taken into account all the work already done to achieve the existing, approved housing plan for the area.

After years of promises, Labor have spent their first year in power achieving nothing in housing. Now their Planning Minister, Carl Scully's desperate solution is to throw up a high-rise hub of skyscrapers in every Liberal seat. Communities should not be punished based on where they live.

We begin at the bridge on the River Kwai and move towards Burma revealing several bridges up to the site of the Australian Government's Memorial at the cutting named Hellfire Pass and identify several of the extraordinary men who survived the ordeal working in appalling conditions as prisoners of war. Residential Strata Properties and Pets

PROPERTY & YOU - BY PAUL MCKENZIE. **ABS CONVEYANCING**

Changes to the Strata Act legislation, in recent years, now prevents strata schemes with the Owners Corporate and strata manager, from un-reasonably refuse consent for a Pet.



What is reasonable or

un-reasonable? Under Section 137B of the Strata Schemes Management Act legislation (as amended), strata schemes cannot have a by law to ban all pets. The Strata Scheme with the strata manager, can only refuse

written consent for a pet, based on serious safety or nuisance grounds. For example, a rottweiler dog, a breed to attack, would be deemed as serious safety concerns and reasonable grounds to refuse written consent.

Small pets now considered normal part of strata schemes, and good company, especially for people living alone, families and seniors. A Strata Scheme now cannot ban Paris Hilton's little cute dog from the apartment and strata scheme.

Such provisions have been upheld, in the Tribunal case, Yardy v Owners Corporation [SP 57237, 2018], ruled that a barking normal dog is not grounds for refusal or removal, unless the barking is loud and excessive enough, for numerous complaints. Mr Yardy, with his Maltese cross terrier, Baxter, won against the owners' corporation, who tried to set up a by law to ban all pets.

Trial and Error

Anyone who has ever knitted knows there are many twists and turns of the yarn along the way, and no matter how nasty the entanglements are, it will eventually come together. If it gets so tangled that you can't use your hands, you have to cut it off with scissors and tie it together or start again. There are times when you find a stitch that has fallen out. At that point, you have to unwind to do it again. In this way, even if it is somewhat flawed, a piece of knitting is beautifully completed.





New Animal Hospital Planned

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary, located in Dural, responds to calls from all around northern Sydney. Individuals, and organisations including WIRES, Sydney Wildlife Rescue, RSPCA, and others, call for help when wild animals are injured or in distress.



Their priority is to treat and release the animals admitted. If the animals cannot be released, the sanctuary will continue to look after them.

The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary is currently seeking funding to upgrade and expand their facilities, including plans for a new hospital. If built, it would be the second wild animal hospital in Sydney, after the Taronga Zoo Wildlife Hospital.

While the Taronga Zoo Wildlife Hospital already cares for 5,000-6,000 native wildlife patients each year, that is just a fraction of the 90,000 native Australian animals who need care annually.

The manager of Hills Wildlife Sanctuary, Ben Dessen, grew up in the area and has been running the sanctuary for 10 years.

"Our native wildlife urgently need our help and we hope to further develop the sanctuary facilities to create a world-class conservation hub on the outskirts of Sydney," he said.

"There is a desperate need for a state-of-the-art wildlife hospital in the area and we hope to realise this bold vision, working closely with the Government as well as corporate and philanthropic partners."

Julian Leeser MP voiced his strong support for the Hills Wildlife Sanctuary.

"The Hills Wildlife Sanctuary does exceptional work rehabilitating our native wildlife," he said.

"I support the sanctuary's efforts to expand their facilities so that they care for and rehabilitate even more animals in the future."





I am receiving a lot of correspondence from local residents concerned about the current government's proposed radical planning changes.

After years of promises, Labor have spent their first year in power achieving nothing in housing. Now they are proposing a series of desperate zoning changes across every Liberal seat. Communities should not be punished based on where the live.

More concerning is the government's position on New Line Road. The previous government approved a funded upgrade to New Line Road between Hastings Road and Purchase Road, taking the road from single lanes to dual carriageway. \$70 million dollars was allocated across several budgets however, the new NSW government reallocated these funds.

Indefinitely postponing the issue of addressing New Line Road is unacceptable. This road is constantly choked with traffic snarls now and with the government's proposal to significantly increase residential numbers in and around the area this will simply bring New Line Road to a complete stand still.

Labor cannot pump more housing into an area where they are cancelling major infrastructure projects required now, for the existing population. That equation simply does not work.

New Safe Park for Small Pups

HORNSBY SHIRE COUNCILLOR -DR VERITY GREENWOOD

Following strong community support, the Greenway Park off-leash fenced dog park extension is now a reality. Approximately 750m² in size, this well-designed, safe and separate space for small dogs (under 6kg), puppies (up to 6 months old) and elderly dogs (over 10 years old) has seating in the shade and waste bins, dog waste bags and water. There are presently seven existing dedicated fenced off-leash areas in Hornsby Shire and this extension will have a six-month trial period.

There are more than 40,000 pets and companion animals in the Shire, but backyards are getting smaller and outdoor spaces are becoming constrained. Having a speciality-controlled space lets elderly dogs and small dogs like my Humphrey (pictured) to run free to play in the fresh air, exercise and socialise with other dogs whilst their owners relax

As part of Council's recent community engagement process and Special Rate Variation, our Shire will now be better prepared for disaster management. We have been fortunate in recruiting RFS veteran Rolf Pool as our Emergency Management Coordinator. Rolf's role is a diverse one, responsible for being the primary point of contact during disaster events, preparing disaster management plans and guiding future planning to be better prepared. Council welcomes Rolf to our team.

I am pleased to announce that the off-leash dog walking facility for Fagan Park will progress. I thank the community for their feedback and positive contributions to the discussion. This was a request brought to me in my first term as Councillor. These enquiries resulted in a Shire wide assessment which led to four more off leash parks and two more upgraded facilities.



A motion put by Councillor Greenwood at the last council

meeting will result in an assessment of locker requirements at the Galston Aquatic Centre. I have been overwhelmed by the positive feedback relating to the recently refurbished pool complex, however, lockers and accessibility have been raised as further potential improvements.

Finally, our operations team will be once again pitch to Transport NSW a plan to upgrade the bus terminus located at the gateway to Glenorie Village. An upgrade to this facility would result in an improvement to the water stand area and bus stop. A more attractive gateway would be an extension of improvements being undertaken throughout the Memorial Hall and Cenotaph precinct.

In addition, recent collaboration with Hills Councillors has resulted in a plan to escalate the urgent need to complete New Line Road. Only by a coordinated approach, highlighting the frustration of the rural community will this key piece of infrastructure ever be prioritised.

Hidden In The Hills

On a recent visit to the Annangrove Community Environment Centre I decided to take a walk through the bushland near the Centre.


This shrub will grow in the open forest as well as woodland heath in sandstone soils or sandy clay. Flowering period is usually from March to July.

There are two related red and pink varieties which are not as common but can be found in a similar habitat. One is (Styphelia triflora) Pink Five Corners. The other being (Styphelia tubiflora) Red Five Corners.

These plants derive their name from the five stamens that extend beyond the tubular flower which can be around 35 mm in length. They have stiff stems with lance-shaped or triangular leaves up to 25mm long. The fruit of both varieties are said to be edible.

When walking in the bush it is sometimes easy to miss some of these smaller plants that may at times be obscured by taller more vigorous growing shrubs. Some of the most intricately formed native flowers can be located in amongst bushy undergrowth at or near ground level.

The Centre periodically conducts a workshop which introduces people to the diversity of Australian wildflowers along with a guided walk along the track behind The Centre.






