THE ANZAC DAY tradition is one of the most important national occasions and marks the first military action by Australia and New Zealand Army Corps.

ANZAC DAY is gazetted as a national event to recognise and commemorate the contributions of all of those who have served Australia in a time of war or warlike conflicts.



DRINK DRIVING

At approximately 11:44 PM on Wednesday, 12th March 2025, Hills Police responded to a two-vehicle crash on New Line Rd, Dural.

The 32-year-old driver of a white Holden Colorado veered into oncoming traffic, causing a head-on collision with a red Toyota Camry.

Upon arrival, officers detected the odor of alcohol and observed the driver was unsteady on their feet. A roadside breath test returned a positive reading. Subsequently, a breath analysis at Castle Hill Police Station recorded a reading of 0.163.

The driver has been issued a Court Attendance Notice and their license has been suspended.

MAN ARRESTED AFTER MANS BODY **DISCOVERED AT GLENORIE**



A man has been charged after a man's body was discovered on a property at Glenorie about midday on Friday 14th March 2025.

Strike Force Halderen was established by The Hills Police Area Command and the State Crime Command's Homicide Squad, to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of a 39-year-old man, whose body was found on the property on Gleness Place.

Following inquiries, two men, aged 24 and 34, and a 35-year-old woman, were arrested at the scene and were taken to Castle Hill Police Station. They were released pending further investigation.

About 2.15pm on Sunday 23rd March 2025, police arrested a 24-year-old man at a home on Meriden Avenue, Glenorie.

He was taken to Castle Hill Police Station where he was charged with murder. He was refused bail, and appeared before Parramatta Local Court on Monday 24th March 2025.

Inquiries under Strike Force Halderen continue.

ALLEGED STABBING

Four teens have been charged following an alleged stabbing in Sydney's north.

At about 3:00 PM on Saturday 8th March 2025, emergency services responded to reports of an assault at a shopping centre on the Pacific Highway, Hornsby.

Police were told a 21-year-old manand a 27-year-old woman were approached by two teenage girls and three teenage boys who

allegedly began assaulting the man. The woman was also allegedly assaulted when she came to the man's aid.

The man suffered a stab wound to the leg and had personal belongings allegedly stolen. He was treated at the scene by NSW Ambulance paramedics before being taken to Royal North Shore Hospital in a stable condition.

Officers attached to Ku-ring Gai Police Area Command, Hornsby Police Transport Command and The Hills Police Area Command were able to locate four of the five alleged offenders a short time later at a shopping centre in Castle Hill.

The four teens were taken to Castle Hill Police station where they were charged as follows:

- 16-year-old boy charged with aggravated robbery with wounding
- 16-year-old boy charged with robbery in company and assault occasioning actual bodily harm in company
- 16-year-old boy charged with robbery in company
- 15-year-old girl charged with accessory before and after to robbery in company

The three boys were refused bail to appear before a Children's Court today, Sunday 9th March 2025. The girl was released on conditional bail to appear before a Children's Court on Tuesday 18th March 2025.

BREAK & ENTER

On Wednesday, 5th March 2025, a joint investigation between The Hills Police Area Command and Hawkesbury Police Area Command resulted in the arrest of a 19-year-old male. He was arrested for committing multiple Break and Enter offences on residential properties in both The Hills and Hawkesbury areas.

Between 11th February and Saturday, the 1st of March, entry was forced into three sheds at three separate residences, located at Glenorie, East Kurrajong and North Richmond. While inside these structures, a total of 10 off-road motorbikes were taken spread across the three locations.

The 19-year-old was charged with three counts of Break and Enter in circumstances of Aggravation. He was refused bail to appear before Penrith Local Court. It is likely that further charges are coming.

KNIFE POSSESSION

Yesterday afternoon, a teenager was arrested at Castle Hill Metro station after being found in possession of a knife. When police attempted to interact with him, he ran off, allegedly throwing the knife into the bush.

As in previous posts, Hills Police are actively patrolling these stations, targeting anti-social behaviour and weapon possession to ensure the safety of our community.




When purchasing a residential property, comes time for settlement. You are entitled to a final inspection of the property, prior to settlement, known as a pre-settlement inspection.

A pre-settlement inspection, is to make sure, everything is fine, with the property is in the same condition, as you would have first inspected, with the open home inspection. Any fixtures not working, either disclosed by the vendor in the contract, or fixed up prior to settlement. The vendor needs to be fair and reasonable to the purchaser, in the state of repair, to avoid a claim.

The property needs to be left clean, neat and tidy for the handover at settlement. Cleaning does not need to be professional, but a reasonable expectation of the property being normally cleaned well for the hand out. All rubbish to be removed and if needed, the vendor to organised a council kerbside pickup, for excessive rubbish.

Lawns should also be mowed, as part of leaving the property neat and tidy.

Building materials also need to be removed, as rubbish and not kept in the garage or basement level of the house. Case law, this is seen as not providing vacant possession for settlement and vendors end up losing in court, with damages and costs, over building materials left on the property.





News From History Cottage



The Society is fortunate to have among its members, people who are willing to share the knowledge of their special interests.

At the March meeting, Judy Horton, well known for her garden tours and radio presentations, told of research she carried out for a tour of Belle-lle off the coast of France. She researched an Australian artist, John Peter Russell, who had built a home on the island. There he entertained many of the artists who were members of the Impressionist movement. Through his own wealth and artistic ability he became most influential in the development of artists whose names are known to all. While well recognised in Europe, it is only now that Australia is becoming aware of the vital part Russell played in the development of art.

On Sunday the 16th March the Society opened its research centre in History Cottage at 412X Galston Road beside the Cenotaph in Galston Park. Over the last six months archivist, Toni Phillips and helpers, have been working on the Society records, archives, library and indexes. So inviting is the result of their work it was decided to hold an open afternoon to let the public gain some idea of what is available for research. The excellent map collection

generated much interest as did the more than 2000 photographs, Colonial microfiche records and well stocked library. Enquiries for further investigation is welcomed.

On the 12th April Vern Sotter will be our guest speaker. Fagan Park and the Fagan Family play an important part in the history and life of Galston and Hornsby Shire. The Society again calls upon the knowledge of a member, when Vern tells the story of the Park and the Fagan Family. This "Gem of Hornsby Shire" is enjoyed by so many and continues to mature and add to the facilities. Come to the April meeting and hear more of the family that so generously gave their land to the people of New South Wales and Hornsby Shire, more particularly.

After the successful 'A Taste of Wiseman's' festival held last September, it is exciting news that this event will be returning in 2025! The event will be held on 28th September, with much community excitement building again. It is fantastic that we have found a way to include our rural residents in Council's month long Orange Blossom Festival which first started in Castle Hill back in 1957 with a parade. The parade will be on again at Rouse Hill Town Centre.

Not long after I was elected last term, I was contacted by a resident in Sackville North. He told me that he had a number of issues that he wanted to raise on behalf of the community. I agreed to meet him. Upon arriving at Sackville North one Saturday morning, I was greeted by around thirty residents who had long standing concerns that they needed to raise with the hope of them being addressed. These ranged from street signs to potholes, speed limits to vegetation matters and the big one was the decline of Chapel Hill Rd.

I was taken on a tour of Sackville North and shown this road along with areas I had never been to before. Chapel Hill Road would have been an original horse and cart track up the hill and is aptly named this given that on this road there is a chapel and yes, it is on a hill. The chapel itself has an interesting history. That's a story for another day.

The road was barely wide enough for a car, the edges were failing, the drainage blocked up, the trees overhanging and I was even told that over thirty years ago, a school bus went over the edge of the rock face and got stuck in the bush.

Then came the rain and floods of 2022. There are two roads that service the residents down along the river in this area. Pages Wharf Rd is the other and during the floods, this road was cut for many months as it fell into the river. This meant that the trusty Chapel Hill Rd was the only access for residents. Given the constant rain, the road rapidly declined with embankment failures, rock slides and pavement failures.

As soon as Pages Wharf Road was rebuilt, Council set about the significant job of designing the rebuild and stabilisation of Chapel Hill Rd. It wasn't going to be cheap and a difficult project given the terrain. Through a number of state and federal disaster grants, we have been able to rebuild this road.

There was a lot of advocacy to ensure we got this road back to a state that was suitable and one that was 'built back better'. The community held many meetings to discuss this road and provided me with their feedback on what was required, the history and the areas which are of concern during severe weather events.

After many years of pain and frustration, I can now finally say that Chapel Hill Road is complete!

I want to thank those residents who brought this to my attention over three years ago, and for your patience and advice over this time. Also to our Council staff and contractors who took the views onboard and have ensured the project has been completed to a high standard.

We often discuss the importance of getting bushfire prepared, as we should. However, it's no less important we're prepared for other natural disasters, especially the fallout of major storms.

From fallen trees to major flooding, our electorate can never be complacent.

We are all grateful that the situation in Queensland wasn't worse than expected. However, we never know which of us is next.

We can never forget our region is vulnerable and preparation is key.

While storms always remain a threat, the resilience of our local and state-wide volunteers remain as strong as ever.

Six volunteers from the NSW Hills SES were deployed to the affected areas to support the NSW and QLD SES to face and recover from ex-Tropical Cyclone Alfred.

They continue the service of the 11,000 volunteers who came together in 1955 to save people across the Hunter Valley, Central West, and North-West of NSW, when catastrophic floods swept across those communities. It was after those devastating floods that the SES was formed.

70 years later, the incredible work of the North-West Region and the advocacy from their community means that our SES are still central to the work of the NSW SES in keeping our community safe.

Growing Food for Wildlife Project

The Growing Food for Wildlife Project began when local wildlife carers approached The Hills Shire Council and asked if they may have some land where they could plant specific native species to grow for the special food needs of rescued wildlife whilst in the care of local wildlife rescue groups. The Community Environment Centre in Currie Avenue at Annangrove was already an ideal site with a well established native plants garden from which wildlife carers could collect suitable foods.

There was also some unutilised and available land nearby suitable for planting a

range of additional suitable species that has now been developed for this purpose.

An enthusiastic, active volunteer community was already available which could help with advice, as well as help maintain the native plantings.

Some of the rescued wildlife, such as possums, can eat up to 2kgs of native foliage a day! However, they would probably only eat the fresh outer tips of any fresh green foliage provided. Nectarivorous birds also need to eat from flowering native plants whilst in care, so that they can easily recognise their natural food source when released. Collecting native foliage and greens for rescued wildlife is a huge job for busy wildlife carers! The planting plots at the Community Environment Centre contain specifically selected local native





species that wildlife carers most need to help support them to feed and care for our rescued local wildlife.

A group of dedicated Volunteers tend to these planting plots at monthly working bees, then regularly harvest and donate available native foliage to wildlife carers who need it. They continue to provide supplies for injured wildlife whilst bringing like-minded communities together in a much needed support activity.





Dural Rainfall Charts


