#### Shared Pedestrian/Cycling Pathway Proposed for Old Northern Road

Hornsby Shire Council is progressing with a proposal from Councillor Nathan Tilbury for the delivery of an off-road Active Transport corridor adjacent to Old Northern Road, between Glenorie and Dural.

At their June meeting Council unanimously supported Councillor Tilbury's motion to work directly with The Hills Shire Council and seek the support of the relevant NSW government Ministers, local State and Federal MPs, as well as Transport for NSW, to develop a feasibility study to the proposal.



As a clear sign of support, it is understood The Hills Shire Council will consider a similar motion via Councillor Mitchell Blue at an upcoming meeting.

Councillor Tilbury explained, "At present there is no safe pedestrian or cycling pathway along Old Northern Road between Glenorie and Dural, which spans approximately 11.5 km. Tragically, pedestrians have been killed walking along Old Northern Road, with the most recent death in November 2024. For some time, Mid Dural Public School has also raised serious concerns about pedestrian safety along Old Northern Road due to lack of paths and road crossing facilities around the school.

In addition, I have been regularly contacted by many local residents about the lack of a footpath along Old Northern Road, including residents living with disabilities that affect their mobility."

Local community groups have already enthusiastically rallied behind the proposal including the Glenorie Progress Association (GPA) and Arcadia Galston Residents Association (AGRA).

GPA President, Di Coxon-Ellis said, "It is far too dangerous to move around as a pedestrian and we have limited public transport options between Glenorie and Dural. We commend this proposal that aligns with our vision of connectivity and safety of our residents."

It is important to note that Old Northern Road is State Road controlled making it the responsibility of Transport for NSW. The Councils will be jointly requesting funding support, through opportunities such as NSW Government grants, to undertake the feasibility study for the project and for its eventual delivery that is likely to be split over several stages.

A major challenge that needs to be overcome is that Old Northern Road is the boundary between Hornsby Shire and The Hills Shire, as well as the local State and Federal electorates boundaries. It is crucial that the two councils and all local MPs work collaboratively, to give the proposal every chance of success.

It is expected that the feasibility study will highlight the issues and complexities of this project to inform its design and the best way to apply for grants.

Hornsby Council has previously delivered similar, albeit shorter, shared pathway projects, including between Hornsby and Mt Colah, along Peats Ferry Road and the Pacific Highway. More recently one was completed along Brooklyn Road, between Hawkesbury River railway station and Kangaroo Point, that was delivered in stages and funded by NSW Government grants.

# Dural Town Centre Gets Approval

The shopping centre development at 488 Old Northern Road Dural (currently a green field alongside Stonelea Court), has received approval. Redevelop announced this on Tuesday 24th June:

"Anchored by a major national Supermarket and complemented by a diverse lifestyle offering, Dural Town Centre is set to become a vibrant local hub for shopping, wellness, dining, and everyday living.

- A full-line Woolworths Supermarkets
- ALDI Stores Australia Supermarket
- A full-line Dan Murphy's Liquor Store
- A large-format medical and allied health Precinct
- A modern fitness and wellness centre
- A curated food and dining precinct

The centre will deliver over 10,000 sqm of Lettable Floor Area and feature 500+ car parking spaces, including dedicated EV charging stations to support sustainable mobility.

To enhance access and safety, the project will also deliver a new signalised all-ways intersection and roadwork upgrades along Old Northern Road, improving traffic flow and connectivity for the wider community."

This is separate from the proposed Shopping Centre at the existing Round Corner Mall which was presented to locals at a community meeting at the Dural Country Club earlier this year.

#### SPEEDING

A man with a suspended licence is expected to appear in court after he was caught speeding in Glenorie on Thursday morning.

At approximately 9:20 am on 19th June, Hills Highway Patrol officers were conducting speed enforcement duties along Cattai Ridge Road when they detected a white Toyota Land Cruiser travelling at 83 in a 60 km/h zone.

The vehicle was stopped on Smith Lane, where police spoke to the 31-year-old male driver. During the interaction, the man reportedly told officers, "I am suspended."

Inquiries confirmed his NSW licence had been suspended following a separate offence on 19th April, in which he was allegedly clocked at more than 45 km/h over the limit on Old Northern Road in Dural.

Despite the suspension, the driver was again found behind the wheel and allegedly exceeding the speed limit. A roadside breath test returned a negative reading.

He will face court for driving while suspended and for speeding. Police said the incident highlighted a disregard for road safety and licence conditions.

#### **OFFICER AWARDED**



The Governor-General of Australia, Her Excellency the Honourable Ms Sam Mostyn AC, visited Warrah Specialist School in Dural on Wednesday, 20th June, to tour the facility and meet with staff and students.

During the visit, the Governor-General presented Senior Constable Mick Barnes, the local Vulnerable Persons Officer, with a challenge coin in recognition of the efforts of Hills Police in supporting people with disabilities in the community.

The presentation acknowledged the ongoing work by local police to assist and protect vulnerable individuals through dedicated engagement and support initiatives.

#### **ERRATIC DRIVING**

An 18-year-old male has been charged with mid-range drink driving after being stopped for erratic driving in Kellyville during the early hours of 19th June.

At around 3:30am, Hills Police observed a vehicle swerving across lanes on Samantha Riley Drive. The driver turned onto Glenhaven Road and then Bannerman Road, where police activated their lights and stopped the vehicle.

The driver underwent a roadside breath test, which returned a positive result. He was arrested and taken to Castle Hill Police Station, where a breath analysis recorded a mid-range reading of 0.083.

Further checks revealed that the vehicle had previously been issued with a Major Defect Notice (Red Label) and was not permitted to be driven after 5:35pm on 18th June.

The driver's licence was immediately suspended. He has been issued a Court Attendance Notice and the matter is now before the court.

#### **APPLE PAY PRANK**

People are being warned about an "ApplePay pranks" following a violent confrontation in Castle Hill on Thursday, 5th June.

Police were called after a 17-year-old male approached an older man pretending to receive money via Apple Pay by holding his phone near the older man and playing a beeping sound. The teenager was detained by the older man and escorted to Castle Hill Police Station.

The trend misleadingly implies that money is being transferred between phones by playing a sound similar to a digital transaction.

Police say while the videos may seem like harmless fun, these pranks may escalate into dangerous situations as they can cause confusion and may even create fear and aggression among people, especially those who are unaware of what's happening.

"We remind everyone that filming strangers without consent and engaging in conduct that causes alarm or distress can have legal consequences," The Hills Police said.

If you witness or experience similar behaviour, please report it to your local police station or call Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

#### **ROAD RAGE**

The Hills Police is appealing for information about an alleged road rage incident involving a grey 2012 Toyota Camry in the Norwest and Castle Hill areas, that happened between 8 pm to 10.20 pm on Monday, 2nd June.

At around 8.05 pm, the Camry driver allegedly flashed a knife and threw a vape at another driver. The victim followed the vehicle and notified police.

The situation escalated when the victim and the Camry driver arrived at Spurway Drive, Norwest, where several persons armed with knives and machetes approached the victim.

After the incident, police engaged in two pursuits on Showground Road, Castle Hill.

Both attempts were stopped due to the Camry's manner of driving. Police say despite patrols, the vehicle was not located.

Anyone who witnessed or may have dashcam footage about the incident is urged to report the information to The Hills Police Area Command on 02 9680 5399 or Crime Stoppers.

#### **DRINK DRIVING P-PLATER**

An 18-year-old P1 driver will face court after allegedly crashing into two parked vehicles while over the legal alcohol limit in Castle Hill.

At approximately 1:09 am on Saturday, 21st June, Hills Police responded to a collision on Warwick Parade. The driver's silver Mitsubishi ASX had struck a parked Hyundai i30 before continuing forward and crashing into the rear of a Holden Colorado, causing significant damage.

The impact pushed the Holden several metres and onto the kerb. The Mitsubishi sustained major front-end damage and came to rest against the eastern kerb.

Nearby residents, woken by the crash, assisted the driver and contacted police. The driver told officers he had reached down to pick up his mobile phone moments before the collision.

He was subjected to a roadside breath test, which returned a positive result. A subsequent breath analysis at Castle Hill Police Station returned a mid-range reading of 0.117.

The driver allegedly admitted to consuming four alcoholic ciders earlier that evening. His licence was immediately suspended, and he was issued a Court Attendance Notice for mid-range drink driving.

His garden became more than a

passion - it was his sanctuary, a place

of creativity, solace, and pride.

Throughout his life, Allan's generosity shone - whether supporting his wife Dorothy through illness, lending a hand to friends, or sharing knowledge with fellow gardeners and sports enthusiasts. His companionship with Trish and her family became an important source of joy, comfort, and connection in his later years.

A beloved father, father-in-law, grandfather, and great-grandfather, Allan cherished family gatherings, especially Christmas, filled with laughter and storytelling.

# Men's Kitchen is coming to the Hills District

Men's Kitchen was started nearly a decade ago to teach older men basic kitchen skills in a social setting. Men's Kitchen, a registered charity, is now launching in the Hills District in late September and is seeking some key volunteers to bring it to life.

#### How does Men's Kitchen work?

At each cooking session, up to 10 men work together to prepare a two course-meal under the guidance of three experienced volunteer instructors. Everyone chooses the part of the meal they would like to prepare and once cooking is completed, everyone sits down together to talk about and enjoy the meal.

#### Why is it so important?

Good nutrition and strong social connections are critical to promote longevity and good health. Says founder and president, Peter Watson, "It has been proven that people live longer when they feel more connected. We are what we eat, so learning to cook and making new mates along the way is a win-win."

In the Hills District, there are over 15,000 men aged 60 or more, many of whom have never ventured into the kitchen. Says Peter, "With retirement some men lose their sense of purpose and miss their interaction with work colleagues. In some cases, they lose their partners, or circumstances mean they need to start doing the cooking in their household. We fill that gap by positively increasing their life skills, along with helping them make some new mates."

Says Men's Kitchen Head Chef and lifelong cooking professional Chris Chandler, "Our men learn that with a little bit of patience and skill they produce pastry as good as any chef. The pride they feel at producing something they never thought they could achieve keeps me doing this. I've had men who have never cooked a cake in their lives produce a stunning dessert on day one with an instructor by their side." Says Peter, "We started the first Men's Kitchen in the Northern Beaches of Sydney in 2016. Since then we have launched on the North Shore of Sydney, Canberra, and the Gold Coast. The goal is to keeping growing, one area at a time to offer this opportunity to some of the two million older blokes around the country."

#### **Smoke Alarms Save Lives**

NSW legislation requires all residents to have one working smoke alarm installed on each level of their home. This includes owner occupied, rental properties, relocatable homes, caravans and campervans or any other residential building where people sleep.

I was recently contacted by a local resident who expressed a need for information to be published around smoke alarms for the hearing impaired.

For people who are deaf or severely hard of hearing, traditional smoke alarms may not provide enough warning especially while sleeping. Standard alarms use high-frequency sounds that many with hearing loss can't detect.

Fortunately, specialised smoke alarms are available. These devices use flashing strobe lights and vibrating pads placed under pillows or mattresses to alert users when smoke is detected. Some models can be linked with standard alarms throughout the home, ensuring everyone is alerted—visually, physically, and audibly.

These alarms are suitable for all household members and offer peace of mind in emergencies.

The gardens are more than beautiful—they're interactive. I explored compost bins, peeked into a worm farm, and admired the clever waterwise garden bed. There is even a place to donate your used plastic plant pots. Each feature offers a hands-on lesson in sustainability.

I found a book library filled with everything from kids' stories to cookbooks and gardening guides. I left with more knowledge that I entered with and a head full of ideas for my own backyard.

Open Thursdays and Saturdays, the Centre is a must-visit for anyone curious about sustainable living. The centre often runs workshops which are advertised on Council's website. It's a place to connect, learn, and grow—literally.

This initiative will establish tailored guidelines for noise levels, trading hours, and outdoor dining through a Precinct Management Plan. # Hidden In The Hills

# **Sydney Wildlife Carers**

It is more than likely that when driving along roads in and around the Sydney Hills District that you may have seen an animal on the side of the road that has been hit and possibly killed by a motor vehicle.

It is also likely that you may not be aware of a group of dedicated wildlife carers who are called out to render assistance to these animals, as in some instances they may still be alive. In many cases, the wallaby, possum or wombat may be a female carrying a joey. Frequently, the joey survives the resulting impact whilst still in its mother pouch.

There are selfless people who will come to the rescue of our native wildlife and wherever possible will look after any orphaned young, nurturing them until they are old enough to fend for themselves before returning them back into the bushland nearby to where the rescue took place.

One such group operating in the Hills area is called

"Sydney Wildlife Rescue" who will answer their phone number 9413 4300 any time of the day in order to attend to any animal or bird that may be injured in some way. These compassionate people perform their caring task, usually in their own home and frequently at their own expense.

Sydney Wildlife Rescue can also assist with advice on how local residents are able



to provide habitat protection for many native creatures, including reptiles, echidnas, possums and birds, that may venture into residential backyards, and need protection from prowling predators.


# SPORT NEWS Dural Bowling Club

Since July 2023, our HANDS AND FEET ministry has been supporting the community by providing free fresh fruit and vegetables to individuals and families facing financial difficulties.








# Dural Rainfall Charts




