# The Turrell Legacy 30 Years of Building with Heart

When Neil Turrell walked onto his first solo job site in West Pennant Hills back in 1995, the deck beneath him was so rotten it barely held his weight. "Any great business is only as good as its worst employee, and I'm that person," he laughs. "But our team? They're brilliant people on and off the tools."

Of course, the journey hasn't been without its tests. The COVID years hit hard, Skyrocketing material costs, supply chain blowouts, and fixed contracts squeezed the business like never before. "We copped a 39 per cent average increase across full projects. But we kept the doors open. We stuck together." The key to surviving? A simple rule. Recognise that pain is temporary, even when it persists, and surround yourself with people who share your mission. The resilience that got them through those years is now built into the very foundations of the homes they create.

So what does the future hold? When someone walks past a Turrell home in 2055, Neil, who'll be 80 by then, hopes they feel the pride that built it. "I'm not a fan of this throwaway culture. If you're going to build something, build it to last." And after 30 years, it's clear. The Turrell name doesn't just stand for building homes; it stands for building trust, connection, and something that will stand the test of time.



# OOO SERVICES .....

#### **MALABAR REDUCTION BURN**

Fire crews from Hills and Hornsby brigades such as the Glenhaven Rural Fire Brigade and Maroota RFB performed the Malabar Hazard Reduction burn in Dural on Sunday, 19th October.

With a total area burn of approximately 8 hectares in the areas surrounding Yuruga and Malabar roads, crews were up throughout day and night in shifts to manage the burn.

Residents were advised to keep doors and windows shut due to smoke. Crews managed traffic disruptions.

NSW has entered into its statutory 'Bush Fire Danger Period' on the 1st of October and will stay until 31st March next year.

During such period, residents are now required to have a fire permit from their local Fire Control Centre or NSW Rural Fire Service brigade.

On Tuesday, 22nd October, the NSW RFS declared a Total Fire Ban on Greater Sydney, Illawarra/Shoalhaven, Greater Hunter, Upper Central West Plains and North Western areas. This was due to a forecast of hot, dry, and windy conditions.

#### **SWITCHEROO**

Around 2:30 am on late-September, conducting proactive patrols spotted a grey BMW travelling southbound on Old Northern Road, Dural, displaying green P-plates and carrying two passengers.

Officers stopped the vehicle just before Galston Road and observed the driver move into the back seat alongside his two passengers. Further checks revealed the teen was a suspended learner driver.

The driver was charged with driving while suspended and appeared before Parramatta Local Court on October.

#### MAN FELL FROM HORSE

Emergency responders attended a call from an address in Kenthurst after a man in his 60s fell from his horse on Friday, 17th October, right before 9 am.

Tasked by NSW Ambulance, the Mounties Care CareFlight Helicopter and its crew flew to aid the man who suffered pre-pelvic injuries.



CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance paramedics provided critical care after landing in a paddock 100 meters from the patient before he was airlifted to Royal North Shore Hospital in serious but stable condition.

#### **TRUCK CRASH**

On Wednesday, 15th October, a truck crash temporarily halted the traffic flow on Old Northern Road.

Authorities closed the southbound road in Wlyds Road, Glenorie, and drivers travelling southbound were advised to take Wlyds road, Arcadia Road, Galston Road, and back onto the Old Northern Road.

At around 12.19 pm, alternating traffic conditions were in place and, an hour later, all lanes reopened.



#### **Fire Season from Hell**


Firefighting authorities are warning that Australia could be facing an early and intense bushfire season. With warmer than average forecasts and winter rain producing increased fuel for bushfires, early preparation is vital. Professor David Bowman, a leading Australian Fire and Pyrogeography scientist, says, "People are still in a daze after winter and can't imagine, that fires could be unseasonal and early."



### **Tips for Better Communication**

When communicating aim to speak clearly. Be mindful that some individuals may process speech slightly slower meaning they require more time to decipher what you are trying to say. Speaking a little slower can be therefore quite helpful to stay engaged. Avoid shouting, as it can make lip-reading more challenging. If they ask for repetition, refrain from simply increasing volume. Instead, rephrase your sentence or simplify your message. For example, if you state "the weather has been absolutely terrible all week" and they can't comprehend what you're saying, you could rephrase your sentence to "It has been raining all day!" Keeping things little bit simpler.

#### 4. Minimise Background Noise:

Reduce environmental distractions by minimising background noise wherever possible. Appliances, televisions, and other sources of noise can interfere or compete with conversations, making it difficult for individuals with hearing loss to follow. Sometimes it may be possible to position yourself and the person with hearing loss away from noisy distractions for example outside seating at a café vs inside. If you can't eliminate background noise, make sure the noise is positioned behind the person with the hearing loss making the most of the natural shape of our ears.

#### 5. Show Empathy and Patience:

Understand the frustration and challenges faced by your loved one with hearing loss.



Put yourself in their shoes by imagining how difficult it would be to understand conversations with blocked ears. Approach communication with empathy, patience, and dignity, avoiding frustration or annoyance. Remember, they desire to communicate effectively, and your understanding can make a significant difference.

In conclusion, supporting a loved one with hearing loss requires patience, empathy, and effective communication strategies. By implementing these simple yet impactful tips, you can help make conversations more accessible and enjoyable for both parties. Remember, your loved one wants to engage with you, and by creating a supportive environment, you can encourage open communication and strengthen your relationship.

# **Celebrating Numeracy and Literacy Week at Galston High School**




This year's Numeracy and Literacy Week proved to be a success, with students and staff coming together to celebrate and enhance essential skills through a variety of innovative activities.

# **Improving Access to the Cherrybrook Metro Station**

We love the Metro. But getting to and from Cherrybrook Metro Station is a challenge.

Earlier this year, I launched a petition calling for improved access to the Metro Station. More than 1300 locals have got involved and signed the petition.

Following the overwhelming response to that petition, I committed to making a submission to Transport for NSW making the case for improved bus services to the Metro. Since I last updated you about this issue, I have now made that submission and I'm looking forward to receiving the Department's response.

The submission sets out the problems with access to the Cherrybrook Metro and proposed solutions, including the creation of new bus services and changes to existing ones. The solutions I proposed were to:

- Establish a new bus service east of Shepherds Dr to directly connect to the Metro without having to loop around Purchase Road.
- Establish a new bus service that directly connects residents on Jenner Rd and James Henty Dr with the Metro Station (replicating some of the stops of the 635) and loops back via David Road.
- Add a new stop along the 600 Bus route at Cherrybrook Metro Station. The 600 Bus route narrowly bypasses the Cherrybrook Metro and a small change would significantly improve access.
- Increase frequency of all existing services to the Metro Station during peak times.
- Improve connectivity from local retirement villages to the Metro Station.

I recognise that poor bus services to the Cherrybrook Metro are only part of the problem. I'm also continuing to push for improved parking access to the Metro.

I would like to thank the more than 20,000 people who signed the Fight for a Fairer Hills Future petition, which was debated in NSW Parliament on 18th September.

However, I was deeply disappointed that the debate lacked constructive dialogue and offered no clear plan to address the infrastructure crisis in The Hills.

Despite this, we've made an impact and achieved several key wins, including:

- \$220 million committed by Prime Minister Anthony Albanese to upgrade Windsor Road at Rouse Hill
- \$20 million for a planning study to improve travel times on Old Windsor Road
- A pop-up high school announced for Box Hill (Years 7–8) while a permanent facility is built
- \$11.7 million for The Water Lane construction, land acquisition for a new fire station, planning and design of the Terry Road upgrade, and a temporary 150-space overflow car park at Kellyville Metro Station

I remain determined to hold this Government accountable and ensure our community receives the infrastructure we deserve.

I'd also like to thank the Member for Kellyville Ray Williams, the Member for Hawkesbury Robyn Preston and the Member for Castle Hill Mark Hodges for advocating on behalf of The Hills Shire during the debate.

With the weather heating up, you will want to start thinking about Bushfire readiness in your local area. Hornsby Shire is one of the more bushfire-vulnerable parts of Greater Sydney, with around 40% of its properties (over 28,500 homes across more than 41,000 hectares) designated as bush-fire prone land. To help manage this risk, the Hornsby–Ku-ring-gai Bush Fire Risk Management Committee develops and implements the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Bush Fire Risk Management Plan, which identifies high-risk areas, plans hazard reduction burns, manages fuel loads via asset protection zones and fire trails, and involves local residents in preparedness and education.

Hornsby Council also has information on its website on Land Management and Community Preparedness. https://www.hornsby.nsw.gov.au/environment/flora-and-fauna/fire-management/what-

council-does/nested-content/land-management-and-community-preparedness. The NSW Rural fire Service also issues a bushfire survival plan which gives you four simple steps to take in case of a bushfire emergency – its also listed on the rfs.nsw.gov.au website.

Another positive







There is also an opportunity to meet like minded people in a friendly and inviting environment.


